Pastor's Perspective



Aside from the Resurrection, the Feeding of the 5,000 is the only miracle recorded in all four Gospels. The upshot is, there's a crowd of 5,000 hungry men (plus women and children, but who's counting?) and all the disciples have are five loaves of bread and two fish. Jesus takes these meager rations, gives thanks over them, and *miraculously* there's not only enough to feed the crowd, there are a dozen basketsful leftover! Most read this as an act of divine intervention. But others have wondered if the miracle was simpler than that. Was it that members of the crowd were moved to share what they had, and as that spirit of generosity took hold, they found that when they combined their resources they actually had *more* than enough? And which would actually be the greater miracle, really? Jesus supernaturally increasing the supply of bread and fish, or people with limited resources themselves feeling inspired to share what they had with strangers in a crowd? It's hard to say.

There are supernatural miracles and then there is this other category of miracle. Maybe we could call them "mundane miracles," miracles that are the result of mundane human activity leveraged by God's Spirit for good. For example, it is not impossible for everyone in this world to be housed and have enough food to eat. That is doable. It doesn't require supernatural intervention. The resources exist on this planet. Still, we would all agree that if humankind were able to achieve this, it would be a *miracle*.

This Lent, we have borne witness to one of these "non-supernatural/mundane miracles" in our midst. Against all odds, the (Men's) Lenten Breakfast series returned to full strength. We all know so many activities that

died because of Covid and never returned once the world got "back to normal." And certainly, there would have been plenty of good reasons (including the death of/the aging of core leaders, the loss of some key congregations from our association, and the continued weakening of denominational ties) for the MLB series to just quietly remain retired.

In 2023, St. Paul's German Township hosted a single breakfast during the Lenten season, which seemed to have jogged the collective memory of our association. By November, members from churches across the association met and began making plans for this Lenten season. By the time you're reading this, seven of our congregations will have worked together to host six breakfasts and worship services to mark this special season.

What is most remarkable about this revival (admittedly, I buried the lead here) is that this entire effort is lay-led. It is because ordinary people in our churches longed for the fellowship and the shared worship experiences of the MLB Series that the breakfasts returned. No one was paid to do this. It doesn't fall under anyone's job description. It's a miracle. A mundane miracle.

By the time you're reading this, we will have once more celebrated the Resurrection, God's greatest miracle. But let us never forget that around us on all sides are mundane miracles (and the potential for so many more), if we have eyes to see!

Also, like the feeding of the 5,000, everyone goes home from the MLB stuffed full—both in belly and heart!

Announcement via the Vanderburgh County Commissioners and Vanderburgh County Engineering Department.

Through August 25, 2025, Oak Hill Road will be closed to all through traffic between Whetstone Road and Millersburg Road. This closure is required for the reconstruction of Oak Hill Road. The detour around this road closure will be Heckel Road, Green River Road, and Millersburg Road. The first phase of the reconstruction will be done between Eastwood Drive and Voigt Road. For the duration of the construction, the road will only provide access to local traffic. During the first phase of construction, all residents south of Voigt Road will have to access their properties from the south end of the project near Heckel Road. All residents north of Voigt Road will have to access their properties from the north end of the project at Millersburg Road. All Oak Hill School traffic will be required to enter and exit the school to the north towards Millersburg Road.

Once the first section of the reconstruction is completed, the portion of Oak Hill Road between Voigt Road and Millersburg Road will be reconstructed during phase two of the project. An updated notice will be sent out when the change in traffic patterns takes place when phase two begins.





Betty lived a very long, full, and healthy life. She had many interests, but her family was her highest priority, her home the magnet to which they were drawn. She enjoyed cooking for frequent family dinners, preparing everyone's favorite comfort foods. She made cross-stitch baby quilts for all her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. According to her wishes, Sherry wanted to be cremated with no funeral, memorial or visitation. Ziemer Funeral Home North Chapel handled her arrangements.





In partnership with the Indiana State Department of Health

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) is a USDA program administered through the Indiana State Department of Health and distributed through Tri-State Food Bank. It serves to supplement the diets of adults age 60 and over who meet set income requirements.

Participants receive a monthly box of food chosen to address common nutritional deficiencies in older adults, such as vitamins A and C, calcium, and iron.

Boxes may include:

- A 2lb block of cheese
- Canned meats
- Vegetables
- Fruits and Juices

- Powdered, evaporated, or shelf stable milk
- Other high protein items
- Grains / Pasta / cereals
- Recipes and nutrition information

You may be eligible to receive a monthly box of nutritious USDA foods if you meet all of the
